This is 45 credit hours program leading to a Doctor Degree in Biblical Studies (**DBS.**). No dissertation is required for this program.

The purpose **Doctor of Biblical Studies (DBS.)** program is to provide the candidate with an advanced competencies and biblical insights through in the helping profession, preparation and observation for those actively involved in vocational Christian ministry of counseling. Communication, Administration/Education Leadership, and Great Commission Strategies.

- Plan, implement, and critically evaluate major undertakings in ministry toward the fulfillment of the Great Commission and the Great Commandment.
- Evaluate personal, spiritual, and professional development and design a plan for lifelong learning.

### Course descriptions for Biblical Studies degree

Note: there are more courses than what is required. This gives you as a student the flexibility to design your own curriculum by choosing the course of your interest.

#### 1. Course: Introduction to Hermeneutics (3)

Course Number: BIS703

This course is a basic study introducing the student to the science of interpreting the Scriptures. Various phases and methods of understanding interpretation are examined and explored.

#### 2. Course: Biblical Hermeneutics (4)

Course Number: BIS713

This course is a basic study introducing the student to the science of interpreting the Scriptures. Various phases and methods of understanding interpretation are examined and explored.

#### 3. Course: Christian Apologetics (4)

Course Number: BIS723

This is a study of Christian Apologetics for the purpose of equipping the pastor, minister, or lay leader in the defense of the Truths of God. This study is in three parts: 1) deals with various tests for truth in order to lay a foundation for testing the "truths" of various world views, 2) applies the test for truth to those views, and 3) works within the theistic view to verify the deity of Jesus and the authority of the Bible.

**4. Foundation of Faith II (3)**

Course Number: BIS733

This course is a continuation of the Foundation of Faith, which explores the foundation of faith for Christian life. Faith is the foundation of Christian belief.

**5. Course: Old Testament Studies (3)**

Course Number: BIS753

This course explores the entire Old Testament in a practical way. Every book is analyzed based on the principle, the concept, and personages involved.

**6. Course: Historical Books (3)**

Course Number: BIS763

Description: This course deals with the twelve books of the Bible from Joshua through Esther. The historical books are fundamental to the Christian beliefs and practice. Students will find this class very enriching to their personal life and ministry.

**7. Course: Psalms: The Bible's Heartbeat (3)**

Course Number: BIS773

The Bible's Heartbeat is a textbook-commentary on the book of Psalms. This book will be useful to all who study, teach, or simply read and enjoy this remarkable portion of Scripture.

**8. Course: Exploring the Pentateuch (3)**

Course Number: BIS783

The Pentateuch is a study manual, a reference source, and a textbook-commentary on the first five books of the Bible

**9. Course: The Book of Romans (5)**

**11. Course: Pauline Epistle (3)**

Course Number: BIS803

**22. THE884 Christology (4)**

This book presents one of the most thorough and passionate studies of Christology. It covers all components of the eternal existence of Christ, life of Christ, atoning work of Christ, and future work of Christ, as well as other topics. This book's approach is dispensational and premillennial and he offers cogent defenses of his views. This work is both scholarly, reverent, and at times devotional.
